
# Community Showcase – Town of Qualicum Beach – The Brant Wildlife Children's Festival

"Global ROAMS (Rivers, Oceans, and Mountains School) has been a transformative journey for me as a student, immersing me in outdoor education and environmental science. Through the Youth Action Project, I had the opportunity to make a noticeable difference in my community.

For my project, I participated in a tree-planting initiative at Grandon Creek, where we planted an impressive 570 trees. Our goal was to restore and preserve the local ecosystem, and it was awesome to be a part of a project that can make a positive impact.

The experience showed me a deep appreciation for nature and highlighted the power of collective action. Each sapling represented our dedication to environmental dedication and our commitment to a sustainable future.
